

In the Eastern Scheldt estuary we started a few new projects. After a long starting period, we managed to open our "Studio Bruinvis", an unique installation that provides live listening to the resident harbour porpoises simultaniously with observing the animals in the estuary. Besides this we upscaled our Photo ID project with annual teams that conducted research at the Eastern Scheldt and started providing us with unique pictures of the porpoises.



North Sea

Monitoring cetaceans from Stena Line ferries


Surveys are carried out on a monthly basis. Each survey consists of two survey days (day 1: Hook of Holland to Harwich, day 2:. Harwich to Hook of Holland). The total observing time is approximately six hours per survey day. The surveys are carried out by two observers; one on starboard side and one on port side. We use the ECMC (European Cetacean Monitoring Coalition - previously ARC) recording data forms and research methods.





The number of harbour porpoises observed in 2015 and 2016 were in the same range as observed in the period 2010-2014. Numbers in the period 2010-2016 have been considerably higher than in the period 2005-2009.

Sightings of whitebeaked dolphins in 2015 and 2016 were incidental. Whitebeaked dolphins were observed more frequently in the first years of monitoring, However, since 2009 the number of sightings have been lower.

Photo ID

In 2005 one volunteer of Rugvin started to think about the possiblity of Photo identification of the harbour porpoises in the Eastern Scheldt. This is a kind of research which is quite common for dolphin or whale research, but never has been successfully carried out elsewhere on porpoises. We gave it a try on a low profile, but slowly the catalogue grew and gave us the idea that photo identification of porpoises is very well possible.

In 2015 we managed with financial support of the World Wildlife Fund to purchase a small boat, "Zeevarken I". For two years our team drove this rigid inflatable boat (RIB) from Burgsluis and Zierikzee and explored the waters looking for porpoises. At the end of 2016 more than half of the total population was catalogued!




The harbour porpoise counts

Since 2009 Rugvin conducts a so called porpoise scan on an annual base. In assistance of 8-9 vessels, their skippers and some 30 - 40 observers the whole surface of the Eastern Scheldt estuary is scanned from West to East. Slowly the whole fleet sails to all corners of the water by a maximum windspeed of Bft 2. See: http://rugvin.nl/onderzoek/oosterschelde/scans.



Number of harbour porpoises sighted per year



In the first year (2009) of the scan 37 harbour porpoises were count. This number developed into the record of 2011 when a total of 61 animals were observed. Since autumn 2011, a high mortality struck the Eastern Scheldt population, partly resulting in fewer animals in the following years 2012 (42), 2013 (18 under not optimal weather conditions) and 35 porpoises in 2014. This number has more or less stabilized since then, but not yet growing, with results of 29 animals in 2015 and 25 in 2016 (with no optimal weather conditions).

Studio Bruinvis, a unique mondial installation!

It took some years and effort, but in the summer of 2016 the buoy of Studio Bruinvis (Studio Porpoise) and its receiver end at the jetty of Zierikzee were placed (see also front page picture)! The first ever sound installation which makes it possible to listen to and watch harbour porpoises at the same time was being realised.

A big yellow buoy from Rijkswaterstaat holding the hydrophone was placed nearby the jetty and an information pillar contained the receiver and speaker. Thus making it possible to listen to the nearby swimming and fouraging harbour porposies by live transmitting of the sounds from the buoy to the shore.





The process of establishing Studio Bruinvis involved also a Crowdfunding action in order to raise enough money for this installation. This crowdfuning raised not only enough money, but also gained a lot of publicity. From the start many people visited the Studio by bicycle or on foot; it realy became an attraction at the seashore of Zierikzee.

So now, all parties who helped realizing Studio Bruinvis namely, World Wide Fund for nature, National Park Oosterschelde, Natuurmonumenten, the municipality of Schouwen-Duiveland, Clive Menhennet from Magrec Ltd and ourselves can be

proud of this!



Communication and media

A popular national radio programmme, "Vara's Vroege Vogels" paid attention twice to Studio Bruinvis, SBS6 Television programme "Hart van Nederland" broadcasted a nice news item as well as BNN radio and "Omroep MAX". Local media such as Omroep Zeeland and the "Provinciaal Zeeuwse Courant" paid many times attention to Studio Bruinvis.

But also other activities such as the annual count of the porpoises and the activities of the Photo ID team are often picked up by the media.

Also short stories and articles on Rugvin activities appeared in magazines such as Hippo Campus, Zoogdier, ZMF-magazine and others.

Next to this news items were published on several websites from nature organisations like World Wide Fund for nature, Natuurmonumenten SOS dolfijn etc.

Twitter

When the new website was realised in 2012, it was logical to start with Twitter as well.

In the first year, 65 Tweets were posted and we created a group of about 50 followers. At the end of 2016, hundreds of Tweets were posted and received by appr. 400 followers.

Facebook

Rugvin started to have its own profile page on Facebook in 2011. In October 2011 the first few messages were posted after the land based scan around the Eastern Scheldt estuary. In the second half of 2012 we started to think about how we could make better use of this media tool and what we wanted to achieve. By writing in an informal way and inviting people to react on our messages, we hope to become a platform where knowledge is shared and people are enthused about cetaceans by others. By informing and educating the public we hope to increase the awareness of cetacean presence in Dutch waters and the need for their conservation. We posted messages about the results of our monitoring scans on the North Sea and the estuary on a regular basis. By the end of 2016 more than 600 people "liked" us.

The restyled version of our website was established in 2012. This resulted not only in a more attractive and easier to manage site, but also into more visitors. From a starting figure of about 5,000 visitors, we have now reached a number of almost 20,000 visitors at the end of 2016. A good interaction between Twitter, Facebook and lately also Instagram caused part of this growth.

Not only the blogs were in the interest of the public, but also the background information on whale species and where to watch the cetaceans. Since 2015 we have incorporated an English page for our foreign visitors.
